25 people sentenced to death in Florida, and more than 100 nationwide, have been exonerated – one for every eight executed.

- Some have been saved as a result of lawyers volunteering their time, undergraduate journalism students, and just plain luck.
- Some have been saved within hours of execution.

As the innocent wait to die, the guilty are left at large.

- Juan Melendez was released January 3, 2002 after serving almost 18 years on death row. Polk County prosecutor Hardy Pickard lied to the court, knowingly sending an innocent man to death row. The real murderer was protected because he was a police informant. Hardy Pickard is still a state prosecutor. How can that be allowed?
- Rudolph Holton was released January 24, 2003 after serving more than 16 years on death row. Police failed to follow all leads, instead giving a jailhouse snitch a deal to get him to lie that Holton had confessed. DNA testing disproved evidence used against Holton.
